

M: Edinburgh, Brisbane, Washington . . .




What a match!

GRAMMAR

If . . . => Condition but quite sure it will happen

If + subject + verb (simple present) + (complement)/subject + will + verb + (complement) => If I see them, I will tell them.

Condition but possible

If + subject + verb (simple past) + (complement)/subject + would + verb + (complement) => If I had money, I would buy presents for all my friends.

Condition but too late

If + subject + verb (past perfect) + (complement)/subject + would + have + past participle + (complement) => If they had thought about it before, they would have gone somewhere else.



If I were you, I would eat more fruit!
In this sentence, you can use "were" or "was'. Both are correct but "were" is more hypothetical than "was".

A night to remember ...

I must admit I'm not very **keen on** astronomy but that night was just magic. We saw an incredible natural phenomenon: the aurora

borealis, the polar lights. The colours are fantastic. I'm **still** impressed. I don't know **yet** how to describe it! I had **never** seen anything like that.

We met Ana's friends too. Some of them live in Winnipeg like Ana and others live in the area. Their parents work in mining or forestry. Some small towns are really isolated and teenagers enjoy outdoor activities. At our age, they have **already** learnt about wild life and know how to protect themselves in the woods. It is the most isolated area I have **ever** visited.



Life is different but also quite similar to ours: teenagers go to school, play sports and have fun. They just do things differently: they go to school on snowmobiles, go ice canoeing and camp in the snow.

I'm not sure I could **get used to** this kind of life but when you are born here, I guess you cannot imagine another way of living!

Yet => subject + verb + (complement) + yet => I haven't met them yet, but I will tomorrow.

Too = also => subject + verb + (complement) + too => Paul is very nice too.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Nunavut has 4 official languages: English, Inuktitut, French and Inuinnagtun.
- There are over 634 recognized First Nations in Canada. "First Nations" is the expression used to designate Native Canadians, Canada's first inhabitants.
- The first written text on the Far North dates back to 1576 and was written by the English explorer Martin Frobisher.

M: OK. Let's see . . . First, Anglesey.


L: Isn't that an island??? No boats, I hope!

GRAMMAR

Obligation to do something => replace "must" when you cannot use it! => To have to + verb

- Simple present => I have to clean my room. = I must clean my room. I mustn't clean my room. = It is forbidden for me to clean my room.
- I don't have to clean my room = it is not necessary to clean my room.
- Simple past => I had to give her a present.
- Present perfect => I have had to look after my younger brother for hours.
